

Native Curriculum Partnership Graduate Assistant

The Center for Regional Studies, Department of Native American Studies, and the Institute for American Indian Education is seeking a GRADUATE ASSISTANT (GA) for the Fall 2022 and Spring 2023 semesters to assist with the implementation of our Native Curriculum Partnership (NCP). **Application is open until filled.**

The Graduate Assistant (GA) will work 10 hours per week at a 25% FTE appointment for both fall 2022 and spring 2023 semesters. Salary is \$1,008.77/month or about \$25.22/hour and includes a tuition waiver up to 6 credit hours.

The GA's duties and responsibilities include:

- supporting the film director with research and production of two short films for the K-12 Indigenous Film Curriculum and New Mexico PBS,
- supporting participating faculty with research for the creation and implementation of the NCP professional development workshops,
- maintaining and strengthening the IndigNM website,
- performing other miscellanous responsibilities tied to the partnership.

Start date for position: October 3, 2022

Who is eligible: Graduate students who have demonstrated an interest in Native American Studies, American Indian Education, Regional Studies, Southwest Studies, or Film and Documentary Studies.

Candidates must have:

- Excellent organizational skills,
- Computer and website building skills,
- Must be enrolled for a minimum of six credit hours in the Fall 2022 and Spring 2023 semesters, have at least a 3.0 grade point average, and be within the time limit for degree completion.

NOTE: Out-of-state students awarded GAs are eligible for the resident UNM tuition rate provided the FTE is 25% or higher and they hold the assistantship for at least one-half of the semester. The tuition waiver may only be used for courses approved by the graduate program in which the student is currently enrolled.

How to apply: Applicants should submit a letter of interest, a two–page CV, and the names and contact information of three references. Please include both telephone number and e-mail contact information.

The letter of interest should address the following:

- Rationale for working with the Native Curriculum Partnership; background (including coursework or research) in Native American Studies, American Indian Education, Regional Studies, Southwest Studies, or Film and Documentary Studies;
- Computer proficiency and organizational skills;
- Experience working in diverse settings and multi-tasking.
