CRS research is sustained by the scholarly inquiry of faculty and students, with a recognition of the important mentorship, teaching and supervision that involves student efforts.

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CRS Programs and Initiatives

The Center for Regional Studies is a UNM Research and Public Service Project (RPSP) and has complied with RPSP mandatory reporting. RPSP reports are filed with the UNM Government and Community Relations Office. CRS develops its annual budget as an allocation plan to carry out major programmatic initiatives for the ensuing fiscal year that begins every July 1st. CRS provides funding for specific projects, excluding the operating or recurring costs of academic units or other organizations. CRS allocates a large share of its budget to research and other scholarly activities in support of student, faculty and community-involved projects that show potential for publication, will result in other tangible deliverables, or will contribute to the vitality of our communities.

- **Graduate Students** - CRS awards graduate thesis and dissertation fellowships in the form of scholarships. It also funds many GA-ships for projects that fit our mission.
- **Faculty** - Funding is provided for projects initiated by UNM faculty, postdoctoral, and research scholars.
- **Archival** - CRS supports the acquisition, preservation, and accessibility of archival materials.
- **Dissemination** - CRS promotes the distribution of books, journal articles, exhibitions, public presentations, films, and lectures produced under its auspices.
- **Multimedia Projects** - CRS facilitates the production, presentation, and distribution of documentary films and oral histories. CRS encourages and stimulates projects grounded in collaborative partnerships and on extended fieldwork that utilizes photography, film/video, audio, narrative writing and other creative media to capture and convey contemporary memory, life, and culture.

I. Graduate Student Fellowships

CRS graduate student fellowships are provided in the form of scholarships, research or project assistantships, internships, or faculty project-related student employment.

CRS Fellowships

CRS sent out a call for proposals to graduate students, whose research aligned with the CRS mission, to participate in an open competition for its 2024-2025 graduate fellowship award cycle.

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In FY25, CRS provided **\$117,000** in scholarships to twenty graduate students enrolled in various departments and programs listed with their mentors and research topics in the table below. The Ph.D. and M.F.A. students received \$6,000 and the M.A. and M.Sc. students received \$5,000.

II. CRS Summer Internships

During the summer of 2025, CRS awarded \$5,000 stipends to six UNM students for eight-week summer internships in New Mexico. These awardees, who were selected by a committee, were given the opportunity to gain work experience with organizations in the state of New Mexico. \$22,500 of the \$30,000 was paid in FY25. The remaining \$7,500 was paid in FY26.

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III. SCRC Archivist's Assistant

CRS funded a student employee to work 20 hours per week for the Spanish Colonial Research Center (SCRC) during FY25. The student completed the organization and identification of microfilm and photostatic copies to be transferred to Zimmerman Library for use by researchers, students, and the public. This project represents a significant creation of a unique and rare collection based on over 500,000 documents, maps, and sketches collected for over 30 years by the SCRC that will allow the University of New Mexico to provide archival materials, unavailable anywhere outside of separate Spanish archives worldwide, which are now housed in one location. The amount CRS provided to the SCRC for the student was **\$15,000.**

IV. CRS Funding for Special Projects

\$48,176.35 of financial assistance was awarded to UNM faculty members and student organizations whose special projects coincide with the mission of CRS. Examples of special projects include book subventions (indexing, maps or colored pictures, anthologies), travel expenses, honoraria for guest speakers, oral history projects, conferences, special events, and graduate student project assistantships.

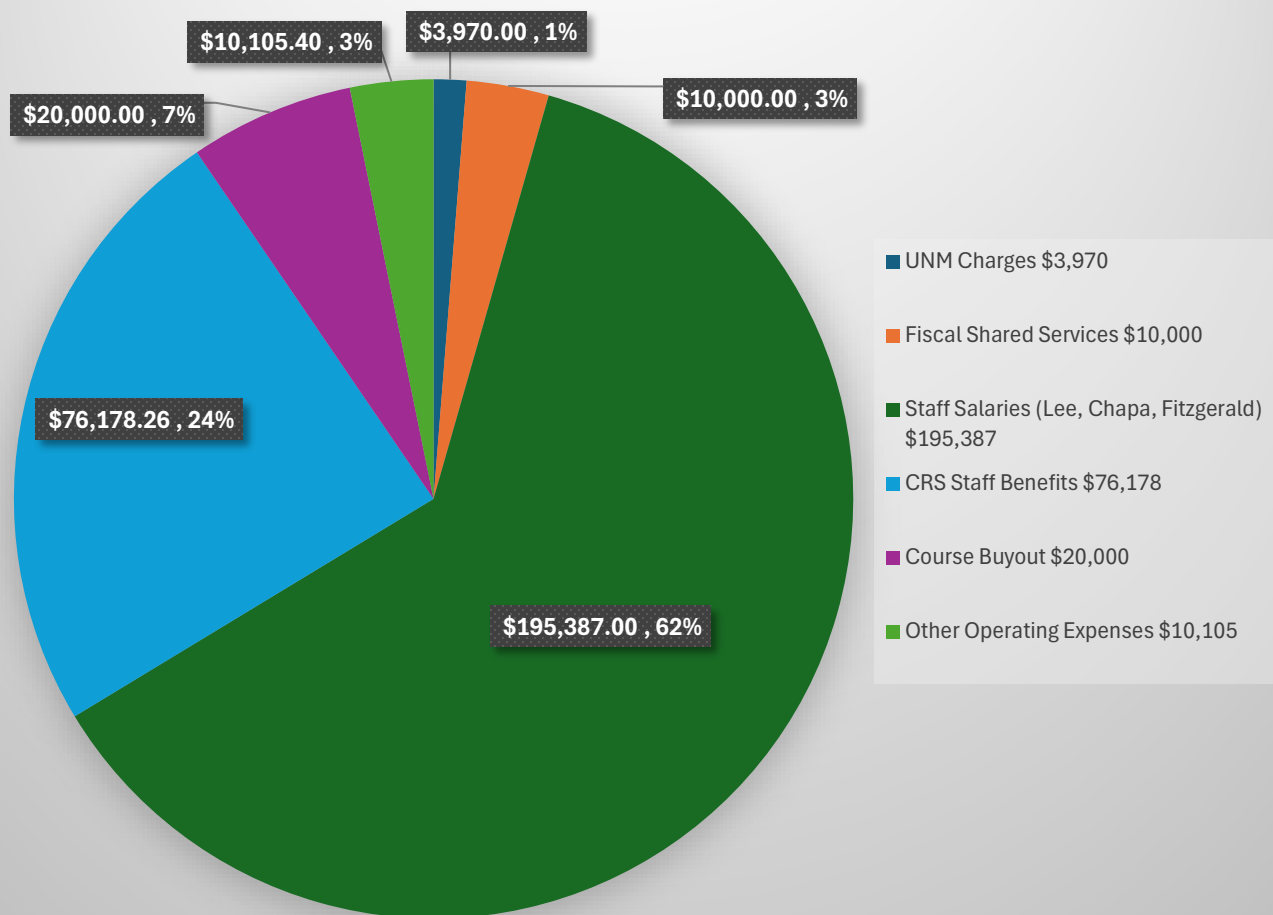

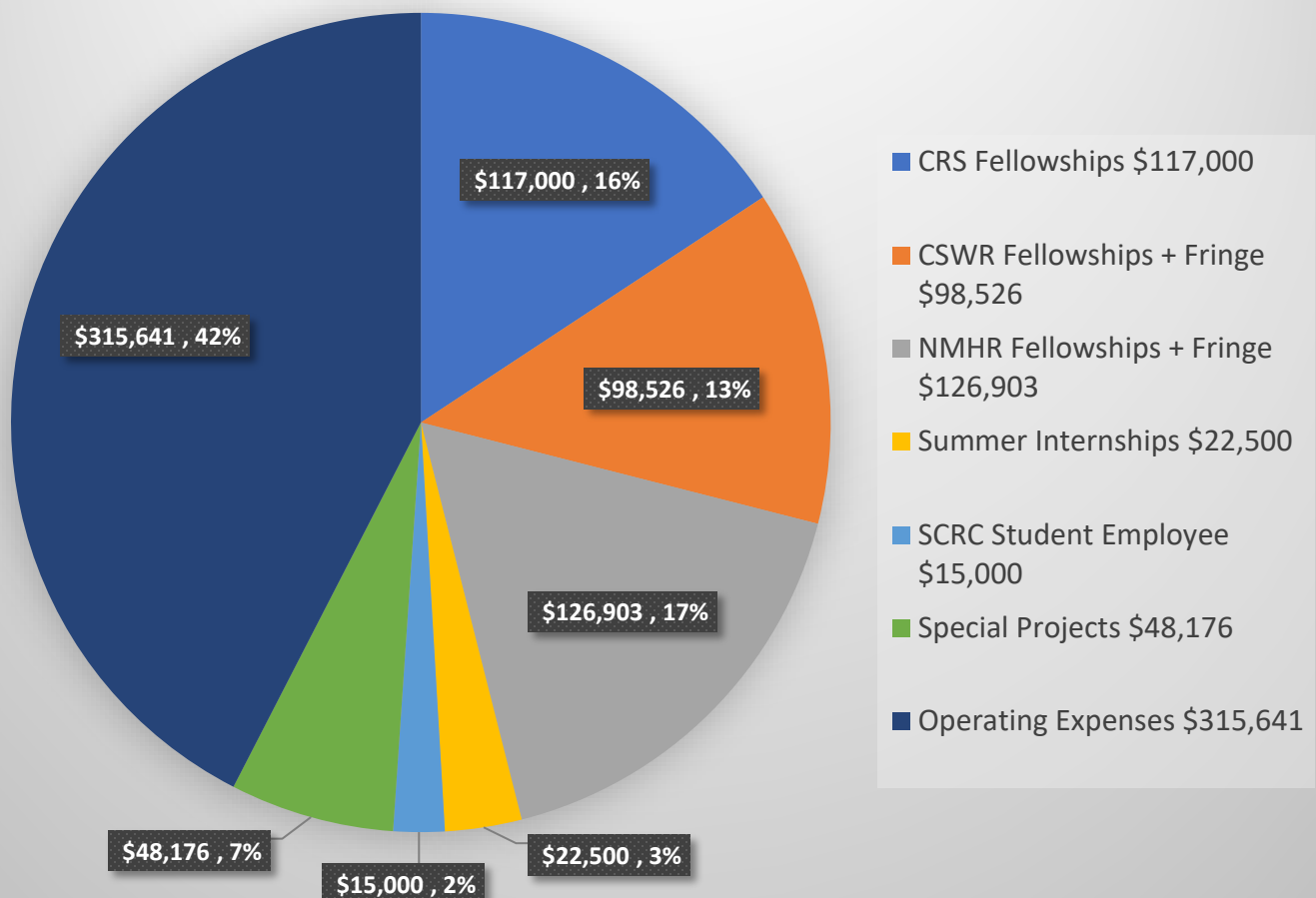

II. Community-based Research Awards

For a third year, CRS partnered with UNM's College of Arts and Sciences (A&S) for its "Community-based Research Initiative." The award supported UNM faculty who were working towards the development and implementation of practical and real-life solutions to the challenges facing New Mexico or Southwest communities in the twenty-first century. The project was to be co-directed by a College of Arts & Sciences department or program faculty member and a community-based partner. While keeping the project aligned with CRS's mission, the goal was for both partners to benefit from the research. CRS awarded **\$37,992.38** for two community projects in FY25.

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III. CRS Postdoctoral Fellowship

New Ph.D. graduates had answered a call for proposals for a CRS Postdoctoral Fellowship. Dr. Zonnie M. Gorman was selected by the evaluation committee to receive **\$51,758** (\$48,000 salary + \$3,758 benefits) to work during the 2024-2025 fiscal year.

Dr. Gorman spent her time at the Center for Southwest Research and Special Collections (CSWR) processing the Carl N. Gorman Collection (1907-1998). This 52-box collection chronicles the life of Carl Gorman through correspondence, publications, news clippings, magazine articles, circulars, pamphlets, handwritten notes, reports, and course materials that cover a wide swath of Carl's life and careers. The collection is a contribution to distinctive Southwest Indigenous history which is now accessible to researchers worldwide.

Carl Gorman was a member of the pilot group that established the Navajo Code Talker program.

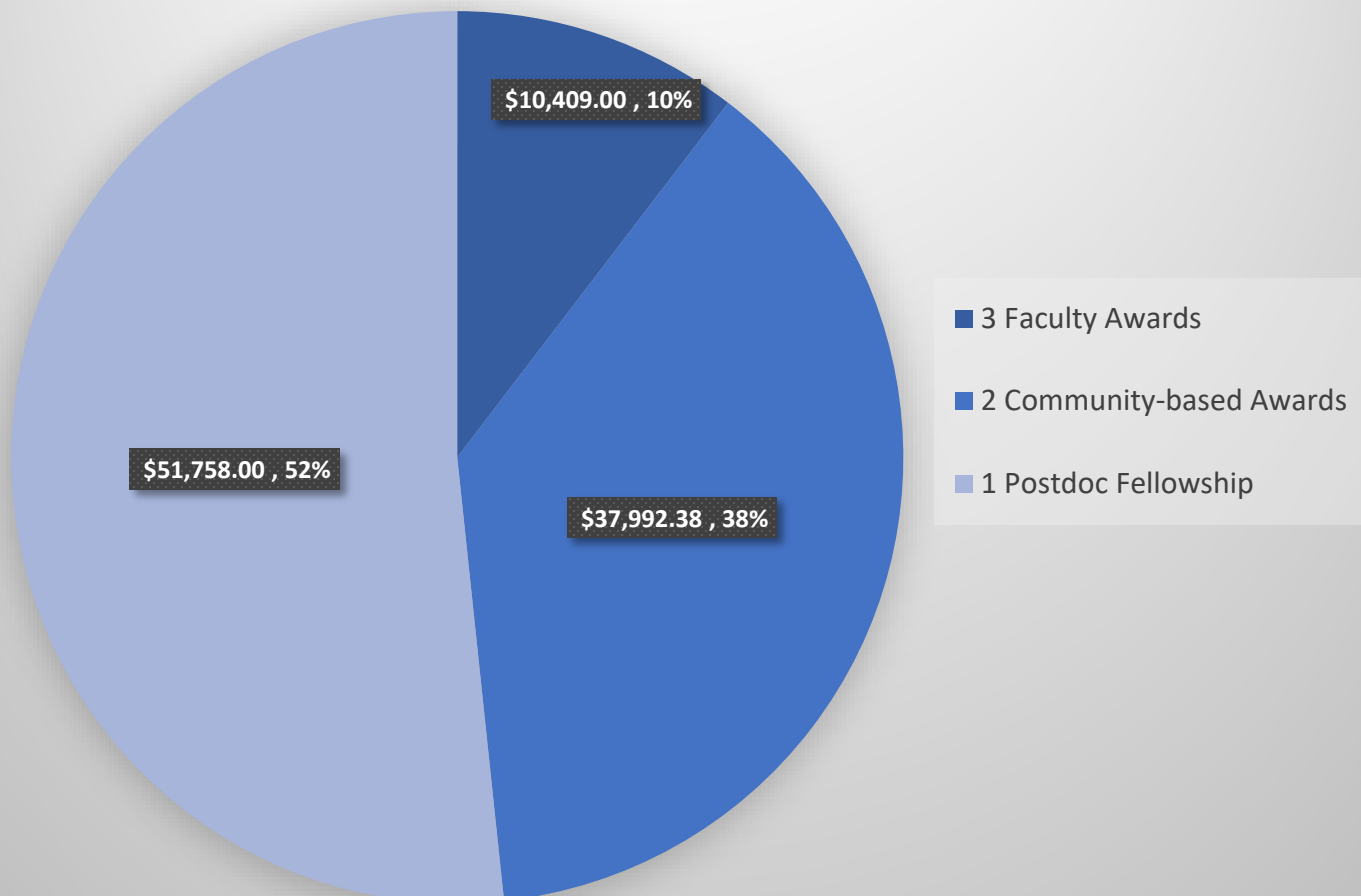

NCP Public Service Account 412009

I. Native Curriculum Partnership

The mission of UNM's Native Curriculum Partnership (NCP) is to create films with corresponding curricula related to various Indigenous topics and perspectives, such as Indigenous Education and Indigenous Art and Activism. Link to website: [NCP/IndigNM Website](#)

In 2022, the Center of Regional Studies, the Department of Native American Studies, and the Institute for American Indian Education came together to form UNM's "Native Curriculum Partnership." For a third year, in 2025, NCP was awarded \$200,000 in Research and Public Service Project (RPSP) funding and collaborated with local tribal leaders, Native educators, and community consultants to continue the process of creating Indigenous film and curriculum materials for K-12 students in New Mexico.

On March 7, 2025, NCP hosted an instructional workshop in Farmington, New Mexico, for high school and middle school students on the importance of filmmaking for native people. NCP members also taught the basics of creating films. Approximately 40 students and 10 adults attended.

Future workshops will include teaching educators how to integrate films into their curriculum, developing students' knowledge and understanding of Native history and present-day activism.

NCP Multimedia

The film production of the two NCP films has advanced with a mix of significant achievements and a few unexpected delays. Production on the film *Roxanne's World* concluded most of the principal photography except for a couple of upcoming milestone events in Roxanne's life that will need to be shot in the fall. This puts the film on track for a post-production phase this winter and completion goal for early Spring 2026.

Concurrently, for the Indigenous Education film, production has mainly been focused on script development. This film will require additional time to ensure the highest quality narrative. This will involve collaborating closely with key scholars and educators to help refine the story for greatest impact and distribution. The goal for completion of the Indigenous Education film is Winter 2026.

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The Art and Activism Film has highlighted the artistic and community work of Roxanne Swentzell. The film offers a view of Swentzell's journey as a ceramic artist and community seedkeeper. Through her community-based projects on permaculture, Swentzell demonstrates the ways Native communities can strengthen their relationships with family, community, culture, and land.

The Indigenous Education Film focuses on the impact of the *Yazzie/Martinez* consolidated case ruling and demonstrates strengths in tribal education and language revitalization practices. The film will include stories from American Indian educators and their experiences teaching and learning in the Southwest, exploring topics of difficult educational issues impacting Native American communities in New Mexico, Arizona, and Utah.
